The regularly scheduled monthly meeting of the Staff Congress was called to order May 9, 1991 at 1:00 p.m., University Center, 108.

SYNOPSIS OF STAFF CONGRESS MEETING:

PRESIDENTS REPORT:

Old Business:

The university's classification process was brought up as a subject of much concern. Dennis Taulbee clarified an incorrect rumor that Staff Congress had voted to somehow support the classification process. Dennis stated it was a misunderstanding from the explanation of Staff Congress giving their support for using the half of a percent 1990-91 money for classification funding.

Other classification issues of concern during the discussion were: pay compression; survey data used to set benchmark levels; appeals being reviewed by the same personnel group that originally did the classifications; retroactive pay for those employees who receive a favorable decision in their appeal, and the limited amount of information available describing the quality of criteria needed for each classification grade.

It was stated that Staff Congress strongly encourages further open discussions of these issues and others related to classification which will be forthcoming.

New Business:

The idea of a New committee concerning budget and salary issues was brought to the floor. Some discussion ensued about possibilities and it was forwarded to the Constitution and bylaws committee for further study.
