The University has scheduled an additional 95 course sections for an additional 4,298 seats in courses to support a planned increase of 500 undergraduate students in fall 2002. ## Cancer patient eager to get back to school

Going to Northern Kentucky University was a family affair for the Brooks family. At one point Mike Brooks, his wife Linda, and their oldest son Mike Jr. were all full time students at NKU

Then an education of a different kind settled over their home, and forced Mike and Linda to concen-trate their studies in a new but famil-

iar area-that of fighting cancer On Oct. 1, 2001, Mike was diag-nosed with a rare form of cancer called renal cell carcinoma, other-

wise known as kidney cancer. wise known as kidney cancer.

It wasn't the first time this NKU couple had to battle cancer. Their youngest son Kevin had been diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in 1992. Fortunately, he was eated and has been in remission

people a year are diagnosed with this type of cancer, and by the time it has been found, it has spread. Most, like Mike, aren't given much

Most, take Mike, aren't given much hope of survival.

Mike started at NKU in January of 1996 after he had retired from his job as a bus driver at Queen City Metro due to a neck and shoulder injury from an accident. His wife, Linda, joined him the following semester. Mike Jr. came after gradu-

ating from high school.
Sometimes they took classes together. Always they were supportive of each other. Mike recalled passing Mike Fr. and a his friend in a hallway of the Natural Science building one day, and turning to tell his son "I love you."
"I did that," said Mike, "because then he'll always have one time that ating from high school.

then he'll always have one time that he'll remember that I told him I love

was accidental," he said. "They did-n't know what was causing the pain in my chest. They thought it was from my neck and shoulder."

He returned to school in the fall.

Then in late September, after walking three miles on a treadmill, he noticed a pain in his right leg. Xrays showed nothing.

A bone scan was done the follow ing Monday. On Tuesday he returned to the hospital because the pain was unbearable. Results of the scan showed growths in both legs

an snowed growths in both legs ad arms and in his spine.

A CAT scan a few days later wealed the kidney cancer. He has not been able to return to school

next season because of his height and overall strength. "He is predomnantly a three, but he will stack up. He is a nice addition and he has had


