Administration—adhering to AAUP guidelines?

The Northern Kentucky University chapter of the American Association of University Professors is holding a meeting today to discuss a number of issues.

Dr. Al Pinelo, president of NKU's chapter of the AAUP, said the main issue to be addressed is if NKU is adhering to the principles set up by the AAUP.

"We have some considerable reservations if that is the case," Pinelo said.

He said the financial exigency policy is of particular concern.

The university is not legally bound to stick to any policies set up by AAUP. However, the national organization lists

the guidelines which most universities follow in order to have fairness and consistency in such matters as raises, tenure, promotion, etc.

NKU's AAUP brought up several concerns in February when it released the NKU AAUP Salary Report.

This report listed the salaries of all full-time faculty for the past five years (1978 to 1983). The report also listed the salaries of top administrators at NKU.

The salary report was sent to all NKU professors who belong to the AAUP. It was also placed on reserve in the F. Steely Library so non-member faculty at NKU could also see the report.

Salaries ranged from highs of \$40,700 (Business) and \$39,900 (History) to lows of \$7,000 to \$17,000 in several departments.

What concerned many who saw the report was that many assistant professors were making more than associate professors and many associate professors were making more than full professors.

Also, in some departments the chairperson made less than the faculty.

The report also brought out the fact that no raises were given to some faculty in a particular department while others in the same department received considerable raises—even though the faculty members seemed to have comparable experience and contributions to the university.

When the report was first available, some faculty members said they felt "outraged" and "shocked" while others said they were "hurt" by such inconsistencies.

Another faculty member, who also did not wish to be identified, said the report didn't take in such factors as dedication and enthusiasm and that all salary figures didn't represent the actual worth of a person—pro or con.

She added, though, that the figures did give a general idea of the inconsistencies in salary and the report could be used to make some general judgments.

The Salmon P. Chase College of Law was also included in the salary report. According to the report, the highest salary made by a full professor is \$54,300. The lowest faculty salary at Chase listed in the report is \$22,000.

According to the report the dean of Chase made \$63,000 in 1982-83 while NKU President A.D. Albright made \$62,600.

'Black Family' lecture

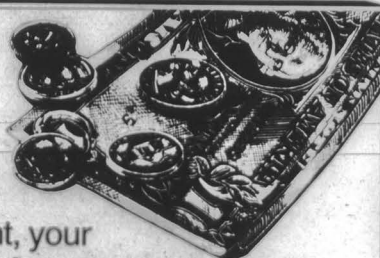
Reporting Tip Income

Plans for NKU hotel now unsure

The plans to build a hotel at Northern Kentucky University appear to be at a standstill.

Dr. Ralph A. Tesseneer, president of the NKU foundation, would make "no comment" if or when the hotel would be built.

Problems seem to have arisen in the project. Jerome Palumbo, a Cincinnati businessman, was negotiating with the foundation to build and finance the 180-room hotel.

About two weeks ago, The Sparta-Sanders State Bank in Sparta was declared insolvent and closed permanently by state banking officials. Palumbo was part-owner of the bank.

Also, according to *The St. Petersburg Times* Palumbo gave university officials a financial statement listing his net worth at \$6.2 million. One of the biggest assets listed on the statement, dated July 1982, is a \$1.75 million investment—the Vinoy Hotel, St. Petersburg, Florida. However, Palumbo did not secure a lease on the Vinoy until six months later.

Ken Lucas, chairman of the Board of Regents and a member of the foundation, said that one person probably wouldn't hold up the building of the hotel.

Lucas said that although he was not directly involved in the project, he thought that the foundation would find alternative financing for the hotel.

Tesseneer had no comment about alternative financing.

Dorm broken into

A Northern Kentucky University student has agreed to pay restitution after causing approximately \$1,500 damage to a residence hall room.

Rhonda Snell climbed through a second-story window of Michelle Cheek's room, D-wing, April 29 at 12:30 a.m., according to statements filed.

She proceeded to tear down posters, knock items off Cheek's dresser, and squirt hand lotion on most of Cheek's wardrobe, according to Cheek.

Also, many of Cheek's clothing items were missing.

Cheek returned to her room to find it in total disarray.

She called Dave MacKnight, residence assistant, MacKnight and Joe Schutzman, another residence assistant, went to Cheek's room.

The residence assistants called the NKU Department of Public Safety. Captain Smith, DPS, took pictures of the room. Gary Eith, director of residential life, and Bill Lamb, dean of students, also surveyed the room.

Cheek went to the District Attorney's of Campbell County to press charges and was told she would have to go through mediation.

The mediation was set for Tuesday, May 3.

It was then agreed that Snell would reimburse Cheek for any damages.

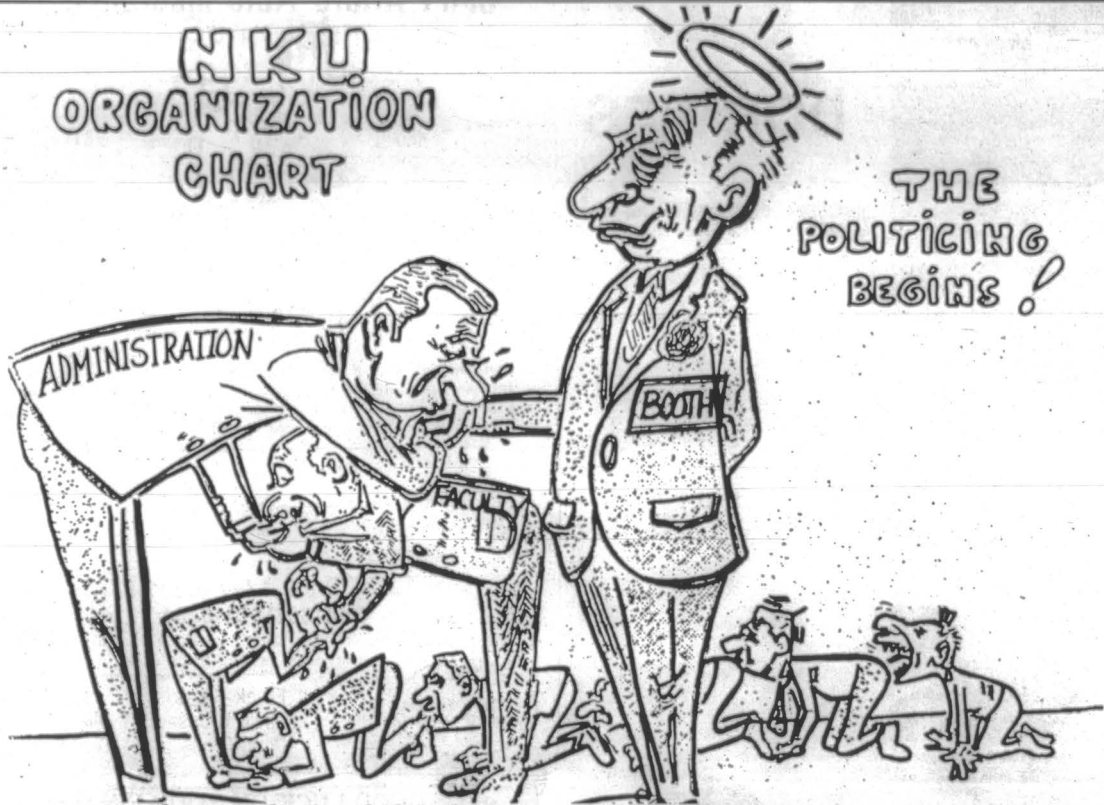

Lack of cycle parking

As a motorcyclist I am concerned about the lack of parking places for motorcycles. There is one space in the lot by Lake Inferior and one place in Lot B.

The past few days, there has been at least a dozen bikes in the lot by the lake. Only eight or nine of these could park in the space provided, the rest of them had to park around the DPS hut.

I have talked to several other bikers and they all feel that a few changes should be made, or at least the two main suggestions should be brought to the attention of the proper officials. These are:

1. More spaces for motorcycles, preferable where DPS officers could keep an eye on the bikes.

2. Also to keep parking lot asphalt from being torn up and to minimize the danger of bikes falling over, all motorcycle parking spaces should be covered with an amount of concrete.

We think these changes would greatly improve conditions for bikes while not taking away from those who drive cars.

SG members asked to resign

To the students:

A study of the Student Government Constitution has revealed that all members are protected from malicious prosecution in that they are guaranteed a hearing with the Governmental Affairs Committee before the assembly can even vote on an impeachment. Given this information, all of the proceedings which were initiated against me were unconstitutional, aside from being unwarranted.

This sort of malignment can not be permitted to exist in our Student Government. The system of student representation may not be used for this sort of personal vendetta, if the real purposes of the Government are to succeed. The individuals who initiated proceedings against me have no excuse for their treachery, and have shown that they are not mature enough to represent the students well. Certain members of the Government have the responsibility to see that the rights of all members are protected, and they failed to do so.
