To da [Today], I recd. [received] by this days Mail

Friday the very appropriate & applicable discourse delivered by Rev. C. P. of Beaman delivered on the sad occasion of the funeral of my friend your beloved and departed Brother & My Friend

Nathan. Which I read with the deepest emotion in tears.

And my prayr [prayer] is that we may strive to emulate him in his gook works of charity,

benevolence & kindness [kindness]. and that when we shall be summoned from time to eternaty

[eternity]. we may be prepard [prepared] to join him in heaven.

On the 24th of January 1853 [January 24, 1853] only a few days before your

bereavement, the aflictive [sic] hand of providence was visited upon our family by removing

taking from us my wifes aged Father G. S. Bruce once a citizen of your place and well know

[known] to you. but for several years past has been lived with in my family. A devoted member

of the Baptist church. and met the monster death his faith and relyance [reliance] on christ was

so great, that he not only talked of, and met the monster death with perfect composier

[composure] & resegnation [resignation]. but seamed [seemed] to rejoice that his time had come.

My aged Father who has from his first accquaintence [acquaintance] ever been a devoted

friend to you & your lamenting Bro [Brother] is still living. And is as companionable & fond of

his friends as ever. though now in his 77th year and much afflicted is o and suffers with almost

constantly with an accute pain in one of his hifs [hips]. It would He will be pained to learn of

hear of your bereavement. and nothing would afford him more pleasure than to receive a long letter from you.
