Southwestern Ky. child may find help here

Chasity Gibson needs a new liver. But doctors at LeBonheur Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., won't give it to her until the 15-month-old gains weight.

Two months ago, the stumbling block was money. Doctors told Charlotte and Jerry Gibson, Chasity's parents, that they had to be assured that someone would be able to pay for at least part of the operation before they could put Chasity on the waiting list for a donor liver.

"They said they hate to be that way," Mr. Gibson said in an interview with *The Henderson (Ky.) Gleaner*, "but that they have so many cases like hers that otherwise they would go broke and couldn't help anybody."

Now, the family, with the help of friends and neighbors in their hometown of Morganfield, Ky., has raised enough money — \$130,000 — for their daughter to be placed on the donor list.

In February, however, the problem was the child's tiny size.

"They said she just wasn't ready," Mrs. Gibson said. "As long as she's growing, they'd rather wait."

And she is growing. In the last two months, Chasity has gained three pounds. She now weighs 17 pounds, 3 ounces.

Meanwhile, as Chasity "scoots around wherever she wants to go," Mrs. Gibson said the family is in limbo on how long their daughter can hold on without a transplant.

"We asked the doctors in Memphis how long she could go on like this," she said. "But all they could tell us is that it's different for each child. They just don't know."

The parents were earlier told by doctors at Kosair Children's Hospital in

Louisville that Chasity probably wouldn't live past 18 months without a transplant.

Chasity's parents discovered their baby had a health problem when she became jaundiced when she was six weeks old. They soon learned that their

daughter had been born without bile ducts, which connect the liver with the intestines.

Because of her condition, the child has developed cirrhosis of the liver and has difficulty gaining weight, Mrs. Gibson said. Both ailments are life-threatening.

Though they have enough to be on the waiting list for a donor liver, Chasity's family and friends are still trying to raise more money, because the total cost of the operation could be as high as \$250,000, Mrs. Gibson said.

Karen Thurman, a student at Northern, wants to help.

Thurman, a friend of Mrs. Gibson's brother, Ray, has been the force behind a couple of planned fund-raisers for Chasity. Tau Kappa Epsilon chapters at Northern and the University of Louisville have agreed to sponsor events whose proceeds will go to a special fund for the child.

Other plans are being made, also. Thurman said she wants to get the help of other student groups, as well as area radio and television stations, in encouraging people to donate money for Chasity.

"I really want to get people from this area involved in this," Thurman said. "People in Morganfield have given just about as much as they can. I really think people in this area might be able and willing to help this little girl."

SG elections, '84

With Student Government elections approaching, tickets have begun formulating campaigns and announcing candidacies.

The first of these tickets to officially announce its candidacy is the "New Phase" ticket. Keith McMain, current SG vice president, will run for president, with Kay Powell as vice presidential candidate; Andra Ward as secretary of external affairs (the position he currently holds); Shelly Stephenson for treasurer; Vicki Bogucki for public relations director; and Maxine Coleman for office administrator.

Phase, as quoted from the dictionary by candidate McMain, means "a distinguishable part in a course development or cycle." The New Phase party hopes to continue the programs and advances of the present administration, McMain said.

In addition, the New Phase ticket, if elected, plans to set into motion a stu-

dent foundation, comprised of non-Student Government members, to carry on programs such as those at other universities with such a foundation.

Powell intends, if elected, to continue the work she has done with the academic senate. She would try to help strengthen the committee chairpersons' positions, so the program could make news on their departments available to students.

Andra Ward, candidate for secretary of external affairs, hopes to continue his work with Kentucky Intercollegiate State Legislature (KISL) and make the university more involved with the Enjoy the Arts program. Ward graduated from Cincinnati's School for Creative and Performing Arts.

As treasurer, Stephenson said she would work to make funding more accessible for campus organizations through Student Government. Some campus organizations find it difficult to find funding for their necessities, she said, and as a last resource, Student

Government would work to allocate funding.

As public relations director, Bogucki said she would work to make the Student Directory available on campus earlier in the year. This year's directory was not on campus until after the second semester had begun. Bogucki hopes, if elected, to make the directories available before Christmas break.

Maxine Coleman is the New Phase's office administrator candidate. She said she hopes to make the office administrator's position more than a secretarial job. Coleman hopes to work with committees on campus, and make available to the students a comprehensive file on campus organizations, containing minutes of meeting, objectives, and information.

Another objective the New Phase party has in mind is making a course syllabus library available in the library. The files would contain information on classes for use at registration and at various points through the semester.

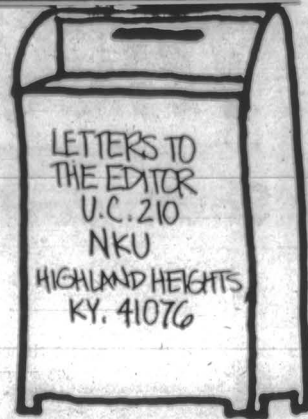

Collins' budget will hurt higher education

To NKU Students:

Kentucky is at a crossroads in terms of its educational future. Succinctly, the Governor has proposed a general fund appropriation for Northern Kentucky University of \$21,062,700 for the 1984-85 year if her tax package passes the Legislature. If a no-tax budget is adopted, the Governor has informed us that Northern's appropriation would be

only \$20,073,000 compared to \$20,221,200 in 1983-84.

The implications are clear as to the devastating effect on Northern of having less money for 1984-85 than we had in 1983-84. Add to the negative budget the effects of inflation and increases in fixed costs over which the university has no control, and the prospective results are alarming. We need your help to keep these potential results from

becoming a reality.

I invite you to consider the seriousness of the situation and to contact your Legislator by phone or letter as soon as possible, letting them know of your support for Northern Kentucky University and the Governor's tax proposal.

Hon column unfair to firefighters

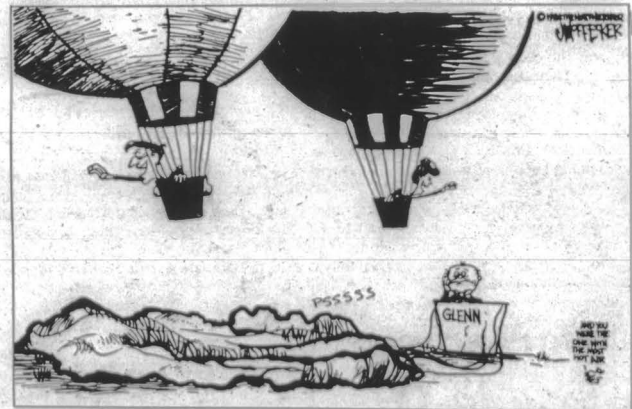
To the editor:

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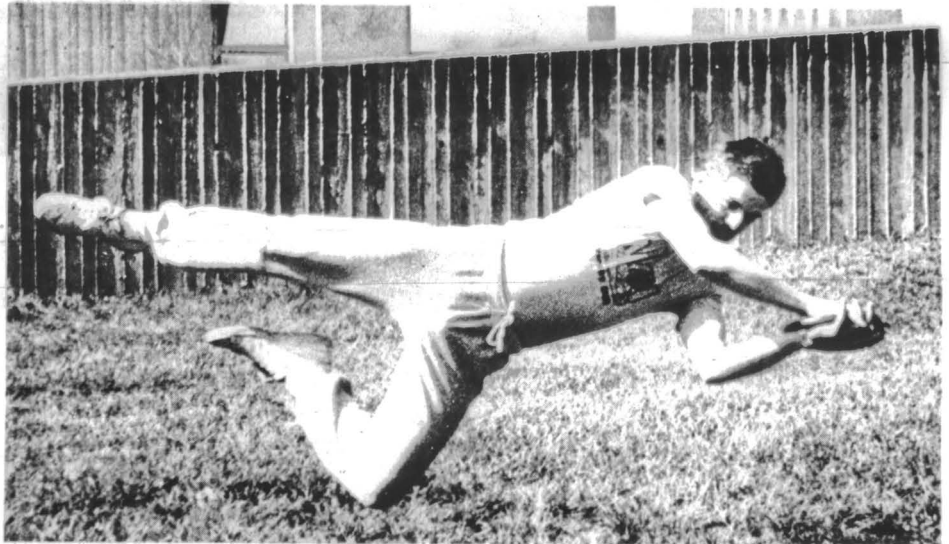
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Intramurals

Dance Concert showcased students' energy, talent

What is a dance concert? It is energy — the exciting and vibrant kind of energy seen only too rarely. The NKU Theatre Department presented the 1984 Dance Concert to sold-out audiences the week before spring break. The show was a success in every way.

The opening began with a number called "Automatic Energy," which was choreographed by a senior dance major, Kimberly Jasper. Jasper created a dance

segment that left the audience wanting more of this energy — and they got it.

The other student choreographer was Cortez Barber, showing off his rendition of Michael Jackson's "Startin' Somethin'."

Both selections were upbeat and precise, demonstrating the planning and long hours of rehearsal necessary for such an event to succeed. Throughout, the audience acknowledged the effort with thunderous applause.

While waiting for the show to begin, I noticed some grumbling from a male
